

OBITUARY.

Nicholas Walker, born in Norka, Russia May 4th. 1862, and passed away April 4th. 1939 in his home at Windsor, Colo. to a higher plane of life. His age was 76 years and 11 months. he came to the United States with his wife and children. they made their first home at Overland, Colo. which is about five miles South of Denver Business district. A cotton mill was located there. He and family were employed there for several years. and for the past thirty years he made his home in Windsor.

He leaves eight children to mourn their loss, namely Mrs. Christena Stoll of Kearsey, Colo. Mrs. Elisabeth Meyer, Mrs. Margaret Kerbs and Mrs. Lydia Kindsfather all of Greeley, Colo. Mrs. Mary Kindsfather of Vancouver, Washington. and the boys are John, Jacob and Henry all make their home at Windsor, Colo. with their families. Also one Brother John who lives in Fort Morgan Colo. and a Sister who makes her home in Norka, Russia. also 32 Grand children, four Great Grand Children, three Nieces, eight Nephews, they are Wackers, Walkers and Scheidemens. They all make their homes in Denver, Fort Morgan and Littleton Colo.

The wife preceded him in the Spring of 1917, at Windsor.

Fall bearers were his six Grand Sons, namely Alvin and Carl Stoll of Kearsey, Colo. Rubin Kerbs, Harold Kindsfather, Carl Meyershd Meyer all of Greeley, Colo.

From 1.30 O'Clock to 2.00 P.M. the service was for the family and relations, which was more than fifty in number, this was conducted in the mortuary, the text was the 95th. Psalm. We then all went to the Church, where the Minister conducted the balance of the service, which was from 2 P.M. to 3 P.M. the scripture was from Hebrews the fourth chapter, from the first verse to and including the eleventh, the subject was REST. All the services were conducted by the Rev. Hilderbrand in German.

The congregation sang one song in German, and the quartet one in German and one in English, which was GOING DOWN THE VALLEY ONE BY ONE.

The crowd was more than could be taken care of, it took twenty minutes for the people to pass the remains in the Church, and a large crowd went to the Cemetery, here the Minister offered Prayer. a large number of men sang two songs while some women joined in.

The weather was fine, only a little damp from the snow the day before, altho the roads were all fine.

Relations, friends and neighbors came from near and far to review their friend that has passed from this Life to a higher understanding.
